EP Rules of procedure, rule 80.1: assent procedure

Parliament's Rules of Procedure on assent will undergo a slight change if plenary approves the draft decision which the Committee on the Rules of Procedure has proposed on the basis of the Wijzenbeek report, which was adopted unanimously. Since the Maastricht Treaty, Parliament has given its assent by voting on the report of the relevant committee, which recommends that the document on which it is being consulted be adopted or rejected, rather than voting directly on the document itself. In order to increase transparency and clarity vis-à-vis the media and the citizens of the European Union, the Wijzenbeek report seeks to correct this anomaly by making provision for Parliament to vote directly on the text in question, thereby avoiding the attachment of all manner of considerations or conditions to its opinion.?
