Transparency and democratic control (Article A, TEU)

Maj-Lis Lööw (S, PES) for the Committee on Institutional Affairs will be presenting her report on the issue of EU openness. She welcomes the Amsterdam Treaty provisions which guarantee that there is a public right of access to EU documents and state that EU decisions must be taken as openly as possible and as closely as possible to the citizen. She considers this to be a first step towards establishing a genuine principle of public access in the EU and is calling for full implementation of these provisions. She makes a number of proposals for improving a new code of public access to EU documents. She believes that the code should apply to all EU institutions and bodies and that restrictions on access should be as limited as possible. Mrs Lööw would also like to see greater public access to Council and Commission meetings; fuller use of the Internet; and more open administrative cultures within the various EU institutions and bodies. Finally she will be making a series of further proposals aimed at making the EU more open to its citizens.?

Transparency and democratic control (Article A, TEU)

In adopting the report drafted by Maj-Lis LÖÖW (S, PES), the European Parliament approved the proposal for a resolution on openness within the European Union. All amendments were defeated. The report requests full implementation of the provisions of the Amsterdam Treaty for a new and more comprehensive code on public access to EU documents and the EU's decision-making process. Among the principles proposed for this new code are tighter definitions of the current exceptions to openness and that it should be applied to all EU institutions and bodies. The Parliament undertakes to take various measures to improve its own system of access to documents. It wishes to see improved access to Council documents when it is acting in its legislative capacity and urges the Council to end the practice of secret declarations. It also proposes that the practice of open meetings of the Council and the other institutions of the EU should be considerably extended. Finally, requesting the development of more open administrative cultures, the report calls for all EU legislative proposals, comitology texts and other important EU documents to be placed on the Internet.?
