Most of these derogations were reviewed, to the satisfaction of all the Member States, during the revision period provided for by the Treaty, namely 01/01/1995 to 31/12/1998. However, it was not possible to complete the review on the above-mentioned labelling issues in time. The purpose of the amendments proposed is to: a) permit Austria to require the use of: - the supplementary pictogram 'crossed-out dustbin' concerning waste disposal, and - the supplementary S-phrase 'Antidote exists, medical staff contact Poisons Information Centre', which concerns measures to be taken in the event of an accident; b) permit Sweden to require the use of: - the supplementary R-phrase R-322 'May be harmful if swallowed' for substances classified in Sweden as 'moderately harmful', and - the R-phrase R-340 for substances classified as category 3 carcinogenic, instead of phrase R-40. For these two countries, these derogations apply from 1/01/1999 to 31/12/2000.?

The only substantial change introduced by the Council in its common position is to address the provisions of the Directive exclusively to Austria and Sweden, rather than to all Member States, as proposed by the Commission.?

CONTENT: the foreseen measures seek to facilitate the completion of the re-examination of the last derogations regarding the labelling of certain dangerous substances accorded to Austria and Sweden in the Act of Accession. The amendments introduced aim to: a) authorise Austria to require the use of: - the additional symbol "dustbin with a cross through it" concerning waste disposal and the additional S-phase "Antidote exists, medical staff contact Poisons Information Centre" regarding counter measures in the case of accident. b) to authorise Sweden to require the use of: - the following additional R-phases, "R-322" for substances which are classified as "moderately harmful" in Sweden, and - for "R-340" for substances classified as carcinogenic, instead of R-phase R40. For the two countries, these derogations are valid for the period 01/01/1999 to 31/12/2000. ENTRY INTO FORCE: 30/07/2000.?
