## Committee on petitions. Annual report 1999-2000

The committee adopted the report by Jean LAMBERT (Greens/EFA, UK) on the committee's activities for 1999-2000. This period was every bit as busy for the committee as the previous year, a trend which it believed bolstered its role within the institutions and put it in a good position to ensure transparency in the implementation of Community law. The report called for more resources to be made available to deal with the petitions received (around 500 of those submitted were deemed admissible and subsequently processed). It also urged various key players to improve their approach to petitions: the Council was invited to attend meetings of the committee and Member State governments were requested to respond more promptly to questions so as not to hold up the process. In an effort to maintain its role as a link between the public and the EU institutions, the committee planned, in line with the report's conclusions, to submit proposals to Parliament in the near future to enable it to work more effectively. Among the ideas it envisaged would be closer cooperation with the other parliamentary committees.

## Committee on petitions. Annual report 1999-2000

The European Parliament adopted the resolution by Mrs Jean LAMBERT (Green/EFA, UK) on the work of the Petitions Committee during the year 1999/2000. The resolution reaffirms the importance of the committee in exercising scrutiny over EU and national and regional bodies concerned with the application of the EU law. The petitions submitted offer an insight into the difficulties faced by citizens with European and national administrations, illustrating quite often inappropriate use of discretionary powers in decision taking, and bureaucratic behaviour which alienates citizens. The positive response of the Commission is emphasised but Parliament also wants to see a more active role played by Council and see a reduction in time delays in dealing with petitions. Moreover, the Parliament calls for a modernised database as well as the use of the Internet in order for petitions to be filed more easily. It also wants to see twice-yearly meetings with corresponding committees in the Member States and there is a call on the Petitions Committee to maintain close contacts with Commissioners. The resolution approves the proposal for the committee to draw up two inititative reports on the main topics of petitions i.e. social security, environmental and consumer protection, freedom and movement and recognition of diplomas and other relevant subjects of Community law.
