Judicial cooperation : genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes, European network. Initiative Netherlands

This document consists of a note from the Permanent Representative of the Netherlands to the Secretary-General of the Council. In particular, this note presents an amended version of the Dutch initiative which aims to create a European network of contact points in respect of persons responsible for genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes. This document specifies precise details of the contacts point's primary tasks (collect and manage information) as well as other pieces of information to be supplied at the time of a request by one or other of the Member States in the framework of the investigation. Lastly, this new version also clarifies the use of the information collected within the framework of the network.?

Judicial cooperation : genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes, European network. Initiative Netherlands

PURPOSE : to present an initiative from Netherlands with a view to the adoption of a Council Decision setting up a European network of contact points in respect of persons responsible for genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes. CONTENT : the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court of 17 July 1998 affirms that the most serious crimes of concern to the international community as a whole, in particular genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes, must not go unpunished and that their effective prosecution must be ensured by taking measures at the national level and by enhancing international cooperation. This proposal states that each Member State shall designate a contact point for the investigation of genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes. Each contact point's primary task shall be to collect and manage information on the aforementioned crimes in the framework of their investigation. Member States shall ensure that contact points exchange, spontaneously or on requests, any available information that may be relevant to the investigation of such crimes, in accordance with their national powers. Each request made under this Decision shall be accompanied by a brief statement of the relevant facts known to the requesting contact point. The contact point shall specify in the requests how the information sought will be used. ?

The committee adopted the report by Timothy KIRKHOPE (EPP-ED, UK) approving the proposal under the consultation procedure subject to just a few amendments. It stipulated, for example, that the contact points should be an office within the police or justice departments and could be existing contact points for cooperation in other criminal matters. It also said that police cooperation should be subject to adequate political

and judicial control in the Member States, and details of the contact points should be publicly available. Furthermore, information on the network of contact points should be provided to the European Parliament for its annual debate on police and judical cooperation in criminal matters. Lastly, the committee was concerned to ensure that closer cooperation bewteen police forces was not detrimental to fundamental human rights. It therefore stipulated that a contact point could refuse to divulge information not only on the grounds that such information could impair a criminal investigation, as stated in the proposal, but also on the grounds that it could prejudice an individual's rights of defence. ?

In addition, each contact point's task shall be to provide on request, in accordance with the relevant arrangements between Member States and applicable national law, any available information that may be relevant in the context of investigations into genocide, crimes against humanity and war crimes or to facilitate cooperation with the competent national authorities. The Council will inform the European Parliament of the functioning and effectiveness of the European network of contact points in the context of the annual debate held by the European Parliament pursuant to Article 39 of the Treaty. Member States shall ensure that they are able to cooperate fully in accordance with the provisions of this Decision at the latest one year after this Decision takes effect. This Decision shall take effect on the 13 June 2002.?
