## Dangerous substances and preparations: limiting the market availability (constitutive consolidation)

This proposed consolidated version of Directive 76/769 aims to produce one single text from the original Directive and the subsequent amendments made to it. This consolidation is done in the interests of clarity and of the ready comprehension of Community law. The existing Directives would be replaced by one new one, which would leave their substance untouched but would assemble them into a single text, with only the formal amendments required by the operation itself.?

## Dangerous substances and preparations: limiting the market availability (constitutive consolidation)

The European Parliament confirmed as its first reading the text voted on 12.02.1992 on a proposal for a Directive on restrictions on the marketing and use of certain dangerous substances and preparations the number of the legal base of which changed with the entry into force of the Amsterdam Treaty.?

## Dangerous substances and preparations: limiting the market availability (constitutive consolidation)

The Directorates General or responsible departments have asked for this proposal to be withdrawn. The reasons are indicated as follows: A) for objective reasons (change of de facto situation, objectives already achieved by other means, etc) B) because the Commission has now adopted another approach : - the proposal is replaced implicitly, - a new proposal is in preparation, - no planned replacement.?

## Dangerous substances and preparations: limiting the market availability (constitutive consolidation)

As announced in Official Journal C 5 of 9 January 2004, the Commission decided to withdraw this proposal, which had become obsolete.
