The Council held an exchange of views on the [EU's strategy for the Baltic Sea region](#) and associated action plan.

The proposed strategy is aimed at creating a sustainable environment for the Baltic Sea, enhancing prosperity in the region and making it an accessible, attractive, safe and secure place.

The Commission's communication comes in response to a request from the European Council last December. Preparatory work has already started with a view to enabling the Council to adopt conclusions at its meeting on 26 and 27 October.
